A guided tour will be offered to all AASHTO members and registered guests of one of the main ports found on the West Coast.

Background Information

In 1891, the Oregon legislature created the Port of Portland to dredge a shipping channel from Portland to the Pacific Ocean. The Port owns several marine terminals, four airports (Portland International, Hillsboro, Mulino and Troutdale) and seven business parks.

The Port also owns and operates the dredge Oregon, which helps maintain the current 40-foot-deep navigation channel on the lower Columbia and Willamette rivers.



Economic Impacts of Port of Portland Activities (based on a 2000 study):

The regional benefits derived from the Port's activities are varied and many. One in six jobs in the Portland metropolitan area is affected by the Port, creating \$1.7 billion in direct earnings for workers and \$4.5 billion in business revenues annually.

Jobs

Aviation and marine activities influenced more than 154,000 jobs in the Portland metro area.

Aviation-related: 74,361; Marine-related: 75,100

Dollars

Aviation and marine activities produced more than \$1.6 billion in total income for the region.

Aviation-related: \$698 million; Marine-related: \$970 million

Business Revenues

Aviation and marine activities generated more than \$4.5 billion in revenues for regional businesses.

Aviation-related: \$3.5 billion; Marine-related: \$921 million

Taxes

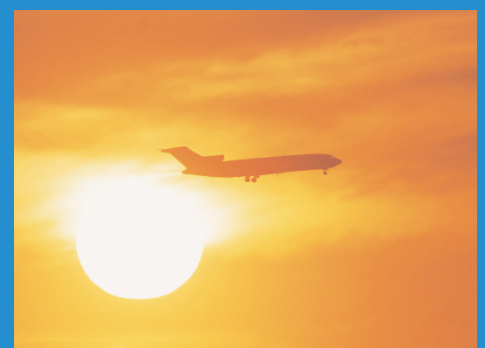
Aviation and marine activities generated \$203 million in state and local taxes.
