# DRIVER INFORMATION

## LICENSES, ENDORSEMENTS, PERMITS AND IDENTIFICATION CARDS

To qualify for an Oregon driver license, instruction permit, or identification card you must be a resident of or domiciled in Oregon and be a United States citizen, permanent resident, or temporarily legally present in the United States. You will be required to provide proof of legal presence, full legal name, social security number and residence address. See pages 8-11 for the identification requirements.

Starting in 2010, if you are a temporary resident in the United States applying for a driver license or identification card, you will be issued a limited-term driver license or identification card. A limited-term driver license or identification card will be valid for:

- Your authorized length of stay, but no longer than eight years from the date of issuance; or
- One year from the date of issuance if your length of stay is for an indefinite period of time.

If you are a temporary resident in the United States applying for a driver permit, you will be issued a limited term driver permit valid for:

- Your authorized length of stay, but no longer than the period of time for which the driver permit of the same type is issued for by the department; or
- One year from the date of issuance if your authorized length of stay is for an indefinite period of time.

You must know which class of license you need. The following list shows the age restrictions, the vehicles each class allows you to drive and the fees.

## CLASS C PROVISIONAL

- Drivers 16 and 17 years of age
- Subject to graduated licensing restrictions
- Eligible to drive the same vehicles as a class C non-commercial license
- Fees: \$60.00 Eight-year original issuance  
\$25.00 Original Limited Term
- See pages (5-7) for provisional licensing requirements and restrictions

## CLASS C NON-COMMERCIAL

- Drivers 18 years of age and older
- Any car or single vehicle weighing 26,000 pounds or less, except a motorcycle or a vehicle carrying hazardous materials
- Vehicles designed to carry fewer than 16 passengers, including the driver
- Motor homes
- Emergency fire vehicles used by firefighters; or
- A vehicle towing a travel trailer, as long as the combined weight is 26,000 pounds or less
- Fees: \$60.00 Eight-year original license issuance fee  
\$40.00 Eight-year renewal  
\$25.00 Original Limited Term license issuance fee  
\$16.00 Limited Term renewal

## MOTORCYCLE ENDORSEMENT

- Drivers 16 years of age and older
- Eligible for or have a valid Class C non-commercial or higher license
- Pass a vision test
- Pass the motorcycle knowledge and skills test or, based on your age, submit a course completion card from an approved motorcycle rider education course (see page 15)
- Fees: Vary, based on your current driving privilege

## CLASS C INSTRUCTION PERMIT

- Must be at least 15 years of age
- Pass the knowledge and vision test
- Issuance fee: \$ 23.50
- Provide proof of school enrollment – see page 6

### **Motorcycle Instruction Permit**

- Must be 16 years of age
- Eligible for or have a valid Oregon driver license
- Pass the motorcycle knowledge and vision test
- Issuance fee: \$23.50

## COMMERCIAL LICENSE INSTRUCTION PERMIT

- Drivers 18 years of age and older, or 21 to drive interstate
- Have a Class C non-commercial or higher driver license
- One year general driving experience
- Must have a valid medical certificate card and when required, a medical waiver or exemption
- Issuance fee: \$23.50

## NON-DRIVER IDENTIFICATION CARDS

- No minimum age limit
- Fees: \$44.50 Eight-year issuance  
\$40.50 Eight-year renewal  
\$20.00 Original Limited Term ID card issuance  
\$18.00 Limited Term ID card renewal

## PROVISIONAL DRIVER LICENSING INFORMATION

If you're under 18 years of age and getting your license for the first time, you will need to meet the following requirements:

### REQUIREMENTS

1. You must have had an instruction permit from Oregon, another state, or the District of Columbia, for at least six months.

2. You must be able to certify that you have had at least 50 hours of driving experience while supervised by someone at least 21 years of age who has had a valid driver license for at least three years, AND show that you have completed an ODOT approved driver education course; OR
3. Certify that you have had 100 hours of supervised driving experience.

*NOTE: If you are under 18 and have been issued a driver license by another state and you surrender that license when applying for an Oregon driver license, you are not subject to the requirements outlined above.*

## SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

If you are under 18 years of age and applying for a first-time license or permit, you are required to show proof of school attendance, completion, or exemption before DMV can issue driving privileges.

Acceptable proof of school attendance is the *Statement of Enrollment*, form 735-7185 signed and provided by an authorized school representative.

Acceptable proof of completion includes a high school diploma or a General Education Development (GED) certificate.

If you are at least 15 years of age and under 18 years old, and withdraw from school, the superintendent or school board may ask DMV to suspend your driving privileges.

## GRADUATED LICENSING RESTRICTIONS

Passenger and night driving restrictions for 1 year or until age 18, **whichever comes first.**

1. First 6 months – No passengers under age 20 who are not members of the driver's immediate family AND no driving between midnight and 5 am (see exceptions).

Second 6 months – No more than 3 passengers under age 20 who are not members of the driver’s immediate family AND no driving between midnight and 5 am (see exceptions).

Exceptions to night driving restriction:

- Driving between home and work
- Driving between home and a school event for which there is no other transportation available
- Driving for employment purposes
- Accompanied by a licensed driver who is at least 25 years of age

Passenger restrictions do not apply while with an instructor as part of a certified traffic safety education course or with a parent or stepparent who has valid driving privileges.

It is unlawful of a person under 18 years of age to operate a motor vehicle while using a mobile communication device. This includes texting or talking on a cell phone. there are exceptions in some emergency situations.

## TESTING FEES

You must pay test fees prior to testing. *If you fail a written or skills test, you need to pay the test fee again each time you take the test.* In addition, DMV requires you to present the same evidence of legal presence, age and identity as required to obtain a license, every time you test.

Fees:       \$5.00 Class C knowledge test  
              \$10.00 Commercial knowledge test  
              \$9.00 Drive test

Check office hours prior to taking your test. Offices do not conduct knowledge tests if the applicant is not assisted at the counter at least one hour before closing times. In addition, smaller offices may close during lunch hours. [www.oregondmv.com](http://www.oregondmv.com) has more information on office testing hours.

## TAKING THE DRIVE TEST

- You must pass the knowledge test before you make an appointment for a behind-the-wheel drive test.
- A licensed driver must come with you when you take your drive test.
- If you have a valid out-of-state driver license, the drive test may be waived.
- Call for your appointment for a drive test up to 30 days in advance.

### NOTE:

DMV requires that you pay for tests in advance. If you are taking a test, please bring a separate payment (for example, two checks): one for your test(s) and one for issuing your license or instruction permit. If you bring one check and fail your test, DMV can not refund that fee amount.

## LEGAL PRESENCE REQUIREMENT

When you apply for an original, renewal, or replacement driver license, driver permit, or identification card, you are required to provide proof of legal presence in the U.S. You must bring acceptable proof of legal presence anytime you conduct business at DMV related to your driver license, permit, or ID card. **ALL DOCUMENTS MUST BE ORIGINAL OR CERTIFIED COPIES.**

## ACCEPTABLE DOCUMENTS FOR PROOF OF LEGAL PRESENCE, FULL LEGAL NAME, IDENTITY & DATE OF BIRTH

- A U.S. government-issued birth certificate;
  - DMV will **not** accept birth certificates issued by a non-Government agency, such

- as a hospital birth certificate, birth card, birth registration, or a baptismal certificate;
  - The birth certificate can **not** be laminated.
- A U.S. consular Report of Birth Abroad (FS-240);
- A U.S. government issued Certification of Birth (DS-1350 or FS-545);
- Request for Verification of Birth (DD372) must include verification from Vital Statistics with appropriate endorsements;
- Valid U.S. Passport or Passport Card, expired no more than 5 years;
- Valid U.S. Territory Passport, expired no more than 5 years;
- Tribal ID card from or affiliated with an Oregon federally recognized tribe, approved by DMV;
- Valid foreign passport, not expired;
  - Must include Arrival/Departure Record (I-94, CBP I-94A, or I-797A) with appropriate entry endorsement;
- U.S. Department of Homeland Security documents, not expired;
  - Temporary Resident ID Card (I-688);
  - Employment Authorization Document (I-688A, I-688B and I-766);
  - Certificate of Citizenship;
  - Resident Alien Card or Permanent Resident Card (I-551);
  - Certificate of Naturalization;
  - Permit to Re-enter (I-327);
  - Refugee Travel Document (I-571).

## FULL LEGAL NAME

When you apply for a driver license, instruction permit, or identification card, you must use your full legal name. “Full legal name” is the name shown on your legal presence document. If your name is different than the name on your legal presence document, you will be required to provide additional documents showing to DMV’s satisfaction a legal name

change. Acceptable documents include, but are not limited to, a government issued marriage certificate/license, divorce decree, judgment of dissolution or annulment of marriage or domestic partnership, certificate of registered domestic partnership, adoption decree or a court order. Documents being presented must be original or certified copy from the issuing agency.

## SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER REQUIREMENT

When you apply for an original, renewal, or replacement driver license, instruction permit, or identification card you are required to provide proof of your Social Security Number (SSN) issued by the US Social Security Administration (SSA).

If you are not eligible for a Social Security Number, you must provide proof of ineligibility and sign a Statement of Not Eligible for Social Security Number, Form 735-7255.

The SSN on an application is confidential information. It will not be printed on your driver license, permit, or identification card and will not be released on DMV records. Access to your SSN is allowed only to qualified government agencies.

## ACCEPTABLE DOCUMENTS FOR PROOF OF SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER (SSN)

- A Social Security Card issued by the SSA (no metal cards);
- A document form the SSA validating your SSN;
- A tax document filed with or from the IRS or state;
- An employment record that includes your SSN;
- A military document that includes your SSN.

## ACCEPTABLE DOCUMENTS FOR PROOF OF INELIGIBILITY FOR SSN

- Documents issued by the SSA, the Department of Homeland Security or other federal agencies or federal courts, which demonstrate you are not eligible for a SSN; **and**
- A signed Statement of Not Eligible for Social Security Number, Form 735-7255

## PROOF OF RESIDENCE ADDRESS

Along with proof of legal presence, full legal name, and Social Security Number, you must also provide one document to prove your current residence address when you apply for a license, permit, or ID card. Oregon law allows you to use a *mailing* address, such as a post office box or business address, *in addition to a residence address*, but never in place of one.

Acceptable proof of your *residence* address includes:

- Mortgage document;
- Property tax statement;
- Mail dated within 60 days from a utility company, the U.S. Treasury, Social Security Administration, Revenue Department, Government agency (if mail is from Oregon DMV it may only contain your current residence address), insurance industry, or clearance letter from another state;
- Oregon vehicle title or registration card containing residence address only;
- Payment booklet dated within the last year;
- Voter registration, selective service, medical, or health card;
- Utility hookup order or statement of account dated within 60 days;
- U.S. Educational institution transcript for the current year;
- Unexpired U.S. Government issued professional license;

- Oregon DMV address sticker with current residence address only.

*Be certain you know the most current acceptable proof legal presence, full legal name, SSN and residence address before you come to DMV. Go to [www.OregonDMV.com](http://www.OregonDMV.com) or call us.*

## NOTE

All documents submitted must be acceptable to DMV. DMV has discretion to require additional evidence to verify your legal presence, full legal name, identity, date of birth, SSN, or current residence address.

## CHANGING YOUR ADDRESS

- Notify DMV within 30 days of your move.
- Address changes can be done online at:  
*[www.oregondmv.com](http://www.oregondmv.com)*
- Address forms are available at DMV office self-service counters and on the Internet.
- DMV will mail your new address label to you to place on your driver license, permit, or ID card.
- There is no fee for the address label.

## ORGAN TRANSPLANT AND TISSUE DONATION

- You may choose to have your driver license coded with a “D” to identify you as a donor.
- You must be at least 15 years of age.
- There is no fee if you add the code when you renew your license. A \$26.50 replacement fee is required to add the code between renewal periods.
- Inform your immediate relatives of your wishes.
- Ensure your intent to be a donor is known by registering at *[www.donatelifenw.org](http://www.donatelifenw.org)*.

## RENEWING YOUR DRIVER LICENSE

- Renew at a DMV office.
- Bring acceptable proof of legal presence, full legal name, and SSN (see page 8-10).
- If your address has changed since your last renewal or replacement, bring in proof of your current residence address (see page 11).
- If you are over 50 years of age, you will be required to take and pass a vision test.

## REPLACING A DRIVER LICENSE, PERMIT, OR IDENTIFICATION CARD

DMV will issue a replacement driver license, permit, or identification card if:

- Your license, permit, or ID card is lost, stolen, damaged, or destroyed; or
- Your residence address changed and you choose to get a new license; or
- You have a name change; or
- You are exchanging a valid-without-photo license for a license with a photograph; or
- You are replacing a license or ID card issued with an error; or
- You are obtaining a license or ID card after reinstatement of a suspension; or
- You are replacing a license or ID card confiscated by law enforcement or the courts.
- You must present proof of legal presence, full legal name, and SSN prior to issuance.
- If you are changing your name, bring proof of your name change (see pages 8-11 for list of acceptable documents).
- If you are changing your address or your address has changed since your last renewal or replacement, bring proof of your current residence address (see page 11 for acceptable proof).
- Fee: \$26.50 Driver License or permit including Limited Term
- \$39.50 Identification Card including Limited Term

## INTERIM DOCUMENT

If you meet all the requirements to obtain Oregon driving privileges or an Oregon ID card, you will be issued an interim card at the DMV office. The permanent license, instruction permit, or ID card will be produced at a central location and mailed to your address on record. Because you will receive your license, permit, or ID card in the mail, it is important that your address is correct. Customers typically get their permanent cards in five to ten days, but the interim card is valid for thirty days.

## PARKING PERMITS FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

Parking permits are available if you are temporarily or permanently disabled.

Wheelchair Users disabled parking permits are available to persons whose physician indicates on the application that they qualify. Permits are also available to programs and families that transport persons with disabilities and to foreign visitors. There is no fee for the parking permits.

- You must have a current, valid Oregon driver license, ID card, or parking ID card to obtain a disabled parking permit.
- Permanently disabled permits expire on the same date as your driver license or identification card.
- Temporary disabled permits are issued for a period of not more than six months and do not require a valid driver license or ID card.
- You will need to submit an application and a certificate of disability (Form 265) signed by a doctor. You may call (503) 945-5000 to receive a form. The form is also available on the Internet at: [www.oregondmv.com](http://www.oregondmv.com). Click on "Driver Forms."

## PARKING IDENTIFICATION CARDS

Parking ID cards are issued to individuals who need a disabled parking permit and are not eligible for a driver license or non-driver ID card or who are unable to appear in person at a DMV office. Parking ID cards are available only from DMV Headquarters. The fee for a parking ID card is \$44.50.

## FILING AN ACCIDENT REPORT

You must report any accident within 72 hours if:

- more than \$1,500 damage occurred to your vehicle; or
- damage to any vehicle is greater than \$1,500 and a vehicle was towed from the scene of the accident; or
- damage to property other than to the vehicles involved in the accident is greater than \$1,500; or
- there was bodily injury or death.

Persons should make a copy of the report before filing it with DMV.

## TAKING A MOTORCYCLE RIDER EDUCATION COURSE

If you are under 21 years of age, you are required to successfully complete the TEAM OREGON Basic Rider Training (BRT) course to get a motorcycle endorsement. A BRT course completion card waives both the knowledge and on-cycle skills tests.

If you are 21 years of age and older you can submit a BRT course completion card for waiver of both tests, or you can submit a TEAM OREGON Intermediate Rider Training course completion card for waiver of the on-cycle skills test only.

## REINSTATING YOUR DRIVER LICENSE

- Requirements depend on the type of suspension.  
Call Salem DMV Headquarters at (503) 945-5400 for your reinstatement requirements.
- Fee: \$75.00

## VEHICLE INFORMATION

Vehicles used on Oregon's roads and highways must be titled and registered in Oregon, unless they are properly titled and registered in the owner's home state. To be eligible to register a vehicle in Oregon, you must be a resident of this state, be domiciled here, or otherwise be required to register your vehicle in Oregon, as is the case for certain commercial vehicles. If you are an Oregon resident, you must register your vehicle here. To do so, you must first have an Oregon title or apply for a title at the same time you register your vehicle.

## TITLING AND REGISTERING A NEW PASSENGER VEHICLE

- Application forms are available at DMV offices, through the mail, on the Internet at *www.oregondmv.com* or by calling (503) 945-5000.
- Complete and sign the Application for Title and Registration, Form 735-226.
- Be sure to include the odometer reading.
- Attach a properly completed Manufacturer's Certificate of Origin for the vehicle.
- Your vehicle may be subject to the Oregon Low Emissions Vehicle (LEV) Standards. If your vehicle is subject to LEV, DMV, or DEQ will need to verify compliance prior to registration being issued.
- Fees: \$77.00 title fee  
\$195.00 4-year registration and plate fee for standard tree plates

## TITLING AND REGISTERING PASSENGER VEHICLES MOVED TO OREGON FROM ANOTHER STATE

- 1) Title application forms are available at DMV offices, through the mail, on the Internet at *www.oregondmv.com*, or by calling (503) 945-5000.
- 2) Complete and sign the Application for Title and Registration, Form 735-226.
- 3) Be sure to include the odometer reading. You do not have to provide an odometer reading if your vehicle is ten years old or older.
- 4) Bring your vehicle to a DMV field office to have the Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) inspected.  
Fee: \$7.00
- 5) Your vehicle must pass the DEQ emissions test if you live within the Portland Metropolitan Service District or the Rogue Valley in Jackson County. For information call Portland area (971) 673-1630; Medford area (541) 776-6149.
- 6) Your vehicle must also pass the DEQ noise test if you live within the Portland Metropolitan Service District.
- 7) If your vehicle passes DEQ, you will be issued a Certificate of Compliance. You must present the certificate with your application to DMV if you are applying for registration.
- 8) Your vehicle may be subject to the Oregon Low Emissions Vehicle (LEV) Standards. If your vehicle is subject to LEV, DMV, or DEQ will need to verify compliance prior to registration being issued.
- 9) Bring the out-of-state title to DMV. Be sure you have the signatures needed to release interest for any name that won't be shown on the Oregon title.
- 10) If the title to your vehicle is in the possession of a lien holder, you will need to forward

the DMV paperwork, including evidence of a VIN inspection and DEQ compliance (if required), together with appropriate title and registration fees to the lien holder of the vehicle. DMV can provide you with an instructional transmittal letter for your lien holder. Your lien holder will forward the original title, the DMV paperwork and fees to DMV Headquarters in Salem, Oregon. DMV will return an Oregon title to your lien holder and forward to you by mail the registration card, plates and stickers.

### NOTES:

Transactions requiring documents from lien holders cannot be processed by DMV until all requirements, including receipt of the original out-of-state title from your lien holder, have been met. In order to expedite your request, contact your lien holder for correct mailing address information as your title may be held in a different location than where you send your payments.

11) If the out-of-state title is either a junk certificate, junk title, or similar ownership document, DMV will not issue an Oregon certificate of title under ORS 803.045.

12) Fees: \$7.00 VIN inspection  
\$77.00 title fee  
\$109.00 registration and plates  
for standard tree plates

## TITLING AND REGISTERING VEHICLES FROM OTHER COUNTRIES

- Check with Salem DMV Headquarters for requirements. Information and forms are on the Internet at *www.oregondmv.com* or you can call (503) 945-5000.

## NOTICE OF SALE OF A VEHICLE

- Seller must notify DMV within 10 days upon sale of a vehicle.
- Notice to DMV should include buyer information.
- Notice of Sale forms can be done on-line at: *www.oregondmv.com*. Notice of Sale forms are also available from DMV or on the Internet.

## TRANSFERRING AN OREGON TITLE

- Buyer must transfer the title within 30 days to avoid a late transfer fee of \$25 or \$50.
- Complete and sign the Application for Title and Registration, Form 735-226.
- Applications are available at DMV offices, through the mail, on the Internet at *www.oregondmv.com* or by calling DMV at (503) 945-5000.
- Be sure to include an odometer disclosure signed by both the seller and buyer. You do not have to provide an odometer statement if the vehicle is ten years old or older.
- Mail or bring the title with all former owner's releasing signatures to DMV.
- Fee: \$77.00 Title fee  
\$90.00 Title fee for motor vehicles with GVWR over 26,000 pounds and trailers over 8,000 pounds (does not include recreational vehicles)

## RENEWING PASSENGER VEHICLE REGISTRATION WHILE TRANSFERRING TITLE

*In addition to the requirements above for titling:*

- Your vehicle must pass the DEQ emissions test if you live within the Portland Metropolitan Service District or the Rogue Valley in Jackson County.

- Your vehicle must also pass the DEQ noise test if you live within the Portland Metropolitan Service District.
- If your vehicle passes DEQ, you will be issued a Certificate of Compliance. You must present the certificate with your application to DMV.
- You must provide your insurance company name and policy number. (DMV will not accept the name of your insurance agent in lieu of insurance company name.)
- Fees: \$77.00 title fee, plus  
\$86.00 registration fee when keeping your current plates
- To view plates and fees, go to DMV's website at [www.oregondmv.com](http://www.oregondmv.com) or call for fee information at (503) 945-5000.

## RENEWING YOUR REGISTRATION

- DMV will mail a renewal reminder to you 60–90 days before the registration expires.
- If your vehicle is not in a DEQ area and you have your renewal reminder, you can register online at: [www.oregondmv.com](http://www.oregondmv.com). Your registration stickers will be mailed to you.
- Complete the renewal application following the instructions and mail it using the envelope provided or you can bring it to DMV.
- Be sure to include your insurance company name and policy number on the back of the renewal application form.
- Sign and date the renewal application where indicated.
- List any address changes on the front of the renewal application.
- Your vehicle must pass the DEQ emissions test if you live within the Portland Metropolitan Service District or the Rogue Valley in Jackson County.
- Your vehicle must also pass the DEQ noise test if you live within the Portland Metropolitan Service District.

- You may submit your vehicle renewal application to any DEQ station to renew your vehicle registration at the time your vehicle is being tested.
- If your vehicle passes DEQ and you don't renew your registration at DEQ, submit the certificate of compliance form with your renewal application to DMV, or renew online.
- Submit the fee that is indicated on the renewal reminder application form.

## REPLACING VEHICLE PLATES

- Applications are available at all DMV offices, through the mail, on the Internet at *www.oregondmv.com*, or by calling (503) 945-5000.
- Your vehicle must be currently registered. The fees below are the replacement fees and do not include the registration renewal fee.
- Fees:
  - \$28.00 for two-plated vehicles at the time of renewal
  - \$17.00 for one-plated vehicles at the time of renewal
  - \$33.00 for two-plated vehicles other than at renewal
  - \$22.00 for one-plated vehicles other than at renewal
- If you are mailing your application to DMV and are unsure of the fees, please call (503) 945-5000 or check DMV's website at *www.oregondmv.com* to get the correct fees.

## MISCELLANEOUS SERVICES

### TRIP PERMITS

*Note: Have insurance information available.*

Permits are available at local DMV offices and through the mail. Fees vary depending on the type of permit needed. In general, requirements for permits are based on:

- whether the vehicle is registered
- the type of vehicle
- use of the vehicle

Trip permits for passenger vehicles:

- Permits are issued for a 21-day time period.
- A maximum of 42 days (2 permits) in a 12-month period is allowed for passenger vehicles.
- The fee for a 21-day trip permit is \$30.00.

Trip permits for recreational vehicles:

- The permit can be issued for up to 10 days. No more than a total of 10 days may be issued in a 12 month period.
- The fee is \$30.00 for each permit issued.
- Person must show proof that they are an owner of the recreational vehicle.

## SNO-PARK PERMITS

- Permits are available at DMV offices and most Oregon recreational ski areas and many ski shops.
- You must have a permit to park in designated winter recreation areas between November 15 and April 30.
- Fees are based on the length of the permit.
- Fees: \$3.00 for a daily permit  
\$7.00 for a three-day permit  
\$20.00 for an annual permit

## PURCHASING DMV RECORDS

Oregon's Record Privacy Law went into effect on September 13, 1997. The purpose of the law is to make personal information contained in DMV records private. This protects people from having personal information in their DMV records given out to individuals not authorized to receive the information. People can order records containing their own personal information but not another person's personal record information.

- Records may be ordered in person or by mail from DMV. The record will be mailed to you.
